Big Bridge, Little Stream: Minot



According to Tom Dune of Albion, president of Lay Advocates at Work, the Bog Stream Bridge on Rte. 124 at Minot, just outside Mechanic Falls. is "the latest monument to bureaucratic waste, through overspend, that is being perpetrated upon the Maine taxpayer by the Maine Department of Transportation."

The \$336,000 concrete bridge built two years ago to replace a small, old woo den bridge that had collapsed and had been out of use for two years, spans a length of 140 feet, although the stream had to be considerably widened for it to do so. The original request, by one Lilo Turner who needed a safe approach to her property, was for a culvert.* or possibly another small bridge.

The width of the final product is \$5 feet, and the load capability is \$0 tons. The bridge is equipped with its own drainage system and is supported with five steel. I-beams, each three feet in depth. There are one-inch thick straps of 10 inches width welded to the I-beams for additional strength.

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The bridge construction was carried out by Callahan
Brothers of Mechanic Falls.
