Arthur Brennan to Judgeship (Circa 1979) --- Joseph Brennan was a major actor in Maine's politically organized criminal network. (((An attempting to find from attorney friend how further info on G. TIMELINE SYNOPSIS

G. Arthur Brennan

Sept.1971 - Dunn relocated within Albion Maine from Baltimore, Maryland;

June 1975 – A Mr. Veilleux, and others came to my farm, stating that they had heard of my background, Requesting that I assist them, and others with serious real estate complaints that were not be responded to by Maine Rea.I Estate Commission (MREC) —

July 1975 -- After reviewing approx. fourteen (14) complaints and related documentation brought against Bard Real Estate (Phil Bard), Winslow, Maine, I demand a meeting with the MREC's Commissioner, their attorney, and the Complainants, which involved a heated debate - but the cases were then moved to the offices of the Maine A.G.'s Office (Asst. A.G. Cheryl Harrington)

Auaust 1975 -- Dunn requested, before witnesses, by Asst. A.G., Cheryl Harrington (Consumer Fraud Division) to assist with the Bard investigation "since you have become familiar with these and our investigators in the MREC are not that swift."

October 1975 - Dunn compiles hundred's of documents (copies maintained on file) and a criminal report that reveals:

1.Bankrupty fraud;

4 .. Land fraud;

6. Judicial misconduct

2.Embezzlement;

5. Bank fraud:

7. Official oppression;

3. Misappropriation of Winslow High School Federal Funds

October 1975 - Dunn meets with A.A.G. Cheryl Harrington, with two of the victims as witnesses, at which time Harrington seems extremely happy and states that the cases against Bard are developing very well;

November 1975 -- Harrington contacts Dunn, request private meeting at her office, at which time Harrington declares that the investigation has been closed, at which time an argument ensues --- over documents that represent unanswered prima facie evidence --- Harrington response stuns Dunn when she

states that. "powerful friends of Mr. Bard within Waterville have entered this matter, and you will never be able to touch Bard." Dunn, angered, tells Harrington in parting - We will see about that!

Nov, / Dec. 1995 Dunn begins an attack by presenting documents to newsmedia-

<u>Dec, 1975</u> - Receive call from Dunn¹s attorney, Stein in Hollowell, who states that Asst. A.G. G. Arthur Brennan wishes to meet with me at Stein's office to review what Dunn would consider prima facie evidence in the Bard case.

Jan. 1976. --- Dunn meets at Stein's Office with a very young G. Arthur Brennan who identifies himself as representing the Criminal Division of the A.G. 's Office, under Richard Cohen --- Dunn & Brennan review three pieces of evidence, at which time Brennan declares that is sufficient to instigate a criminal investigation, but Dunn does not hear from G. Arthur Brennan, or anyone from the AG. '5 Office for two (2) months;

March 1976 -- Dunn visits A.G. Office and is told by Brennan that the case is closed and sealed. There is a heated exchange, Dunn leaves office and begins a newsmedia attack upon A.G.'s Office and those who have been involved in the Bard "investigation" cover-up. (Criminal Complaint)

April 1976 - August 1986 --- Total Conflict with Maine's politically organized criminal network -- Dunn's farm house burned (near loss of three small children) --- vehicles sabotaged, causing accidents and injuries --- ambushed and shot twice (neck and back] - Newspapers full of accusations and counter accusations ---

<u>Ju!v 1981</u> -- Having no success within official offices, Dunn files criminal complaints within office of Sheriff Bazinet (another dead-beat official) --- (Exhibit A)

1981 - 1986 Battle continues at all levels

<u>During this time Dunn is asked to take over the advocacy group L.A.W., Inc.</u> --- Group has 600 members and has accumulated hundreds of complaints of a criminal nature relative to judges, attorneys and government --- but they do no know how to process or investigate them. Dunn selects two dozen of the most serious cases and investigates. Results are evidence of state wide corruption (Exhibit B &; C --- Examples)

<u>August 1986</u> -- Dunn films documentary, relative to Maine corruption, part of which films G. Arthur Brennan in his robes and accuses him of official misconduct and concealment of criminal evidence -- Documentary is show publicly and newsmedia covers event. Waterville - Augusta, Maine.
